Counties Feature

This month we are featuring news from two of Lincoln County Schools presented by Suzy Rios, County Superintendent. Lincoln County has five schools, with Fortine, McCormick, Trego and Yaak under the County Superintendents leadership. Only Eureka School District has its own Superintendent and administration. However, all five schools are members of MSSA.

McCormick School

Nestled in the scenic rural community of Troy, Montana, just two miles from the Idaho border, McCormick School has been a cornerstone of education since 1909. This one-room schoolhouse is a unique blend of tradition and innovation, serving 25 students from both Montana and Idaho with a dedicated team of two teachers.

The McCormick experience goes beyond academics, fostering a close-knit, supportive environment where older students often mentor younger ones, and everyone knows their neighbor. The schoolhouse, rich in history, retains its classic charm while incorporating the latest technology to ensure students receive a modern education. Adding to its charm are the schoolhouse dogs, beloved members of the community.

In 2024, McCormick expanded with the addition of a multipurpose building, enhancing its capacity to host physical education classes and serve as a hub for community gatherings. Located on Old Highway 2, McCormick School remains a proud symbol of resilience, community spirit, and educational excellence in Northwest Montana.

Yaak School

The Yaak School is a rural K-8 elementary school that has served an isolated mountain community in Northwest Montana for over 100 years. This two-room school currently has 4 students, one teacher, a teacher's aide that comes in once a week, a part time custodian and part time District Clerk.

The school, built with hand hewn logs and up until recently was heated with a wood burning stove. We strive to maintain its character by continuing to emphasize the traditional skills of reading, writing and arithmetic along with fun subjects of science, social studies, P.E. and technology.

Students have participated in a wide range of enriching activities and field trips, providing opportunities for learning and memorable experiences. These have included attending the play *Wicked* in Spokane with special VIP tours and catered lunches, traveling to Washington to visit the Point Defiance Zoo and Aquarium, the Children's Museum, an art gallery, and attending a double-header game at the Seattle Mariners' ballpark. They have also taken part in unique cultural events, such as rendezvous gatherings and tepee-raising ceremonies in collaboration with other small schools.

Additional activities have included ice fishing, snowshoeing, skiing, apple cider making, and exploring Montana's many historical locations. Students also participate in an annual spring camp-out rendezvous with other small rural schools, fostering connections and cultural understanding.

The spring of 2013 was especially exciting, as students traveled to Washington, D.C., Pennsylvania, and New York to explore some of the nation's most iconic historical landmarks, offering a once-in-a-lifetime educational opportunity.

These activities and field trips not only enhance students' learning but also broaden their horizons and create lasting memories.

Despite the isolated status of the school, students from the Yaak School have repeatedly tested well on mandatory state tests. Perhaps this is due to the amount of individual teaching time each student gets in this small school, or the high level of parent involvement, or the dedication of everyone helping the school to succeed. All the above is true and we are glad we have the opportunity to share our unique school with you.
